Questions for Student Reflection:

- What did you learn from looking at the Fundreds that your classmates made?
- How was the Fundred Project different from other lessons we've had in class so far?
- How did you feel about expressing yourself with art as compared to writing or speaking?
 Was it easier or harder to express your ideas?
- How did it feel when we sent our Fundreds off to Washington DC?
- How can art contribute to our community?
- Did you learn anything surprising by participating in this project?
- What did you learn about lead poisoning?
- Can you think of any other problems that could be helped by art projects and/or by working together? What are they? How might you make your own art project to address that issue?
- How can we help make sure that everyone has a healthy, lead-free future?
- What are some actions you plan to take to keep working toward this goal?
